			As a current Vermont educator, I voted no on the school budget because I believe the district needs to reign in spending and conduct a thorough audit to identify areas of waste. Vermont outspends nearly all other states and has the highest staff: student ratio, suggesting a lack of efficiency in resource allocation - not a lack of resource. Despite our state's abundance of resources, we must strive to do more with less and prioritize effective use of taxpayer funds. It is crucial for us to address these disparities and ensure that our resources are being used in the most efficient and impactful way for the benefit of our students.	To win my yes vote on the school budget, property taxes must not increase by more than \$500 for an average house. As a current educator, I have witnessed the financial challenges facing our district, and I believe that serious restructuring of the district's staffing to increase efficiency may be necessary for future stability. For instance, having 9 principals for 8 schools is absurd, especially considering that these schools only serve about 2,000 students in total. This disparity highlights potential inefficiencies that need to be addressed. While it may be a tough decision, I see this crisis as an opportunity for the district to reassess its financial practices and prioritize efficiency. In addition to the tax limit, I would also need to see increased community outreach, proactive efforts to reduce spending, and a comprehensive plan for long-term financial sustainability in order to support the budget.

Closing a school should not be done lightly but it needs to be an option. The board seems to be avoiding that discussion.</p> <p>For those concerned about the negative impacts on a community when a school closes, I'd encourage a look at the Bridgewater VT school.
